Come to the next reunion, play on a band and/or write arrangements, see old friends, and enjoy the beautiful facilities. We need you if you are of a mind to join in the playing. Still don't feel like playing? That's fine. Just show up! Each year someone arrives who hasn't been in years. We have some attending this year that fall into that category. 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Minutes of the AKAA Board Meeting

The Auburn Knights Alumni Association Board of Directors met on Saturday, February 26, 2006, at the Auburn Marriott Opelika Hotel and Conference Center at Grand National. The meeting commenced at 10:04 a.m. The following is a summary of the minutes for that meeting, as submitted by Nat Michelson.

Treasurer's Report. Craig Lunsford submitted the current financial report (as of February 14) which showed a \$2250 surplus as compared to the same time last year.

Librarian's Report. Tom Winstead reported continued growth of the library through donations and his ongoing restoration of older charts with missing parts. Some discussion regarding the AKAA's intellectual property rights and obligations under current copyright and patent laws followed, and the board authorized Fritz Siler and Mr. Winstead to consult an attorney who specializes in the field of intellectual properties.

Current Band Report. Per Ricky Callaway, the AKO's projected cash



flow position is better than at any time since the era when members actually paid for their college career via AKO bookings. The AKO is currently looking to fill a trombone and piano book opening. Mr. Callaway noted in his discourse that the band is in a transitional phase, is looking first to the student body for personnel and that the intent of the AKO is to remain a student oriented organization that will do what is necessary to remain economically viable. A lengthy discussion ensued regarding the history of the AKO as a student driven organization with roots staffing openings with current Auburn University students who would grow into the positions with on the job training. President Siler read a copy of

letter, which he had previously delivered to and discussed with Mr. Callaway. In his text he encouraged the band to continue the band's tradition of looking first to the student body to staff openings and emphasized that the AKAA would continue to support the process via our scholarship fund. Discussions also highlighted that the band has gone through many transition phases throughout the years and that there are also precedents of using nonstudents when it is in the best interest of furthering the band's musical mission and positioning the band as a marketable commodity. Noted was Dale Quillen's starting the band from scratch in 1966, with all chairs filled by AU, inexperienced students when he returned to school and found the AKO out of business.

Discussed were the AKO's finances and need of a separate tax id. Noted was the lack of copyright on the name Auburn Knights Orchestra.

A special committee will assist the current members of the AKO to form a new, legally recognizable entity using the name "Auburn Knights Orchestra" as its basis. This committee will assist the new entity in achieving the state and federal tax treatment most advantageous to the members of the Auburn Knights Orchestra.

The board authorized Don Culley, Mark Belfast, Vic Atkins and Fritz Siler to review and modify the AKAA scholarship process to encourage band recruitment from the AU student body. A number of suggestions were heard for recruiting talented high school students to attend AU and join the AKO.



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Bob Richardson Memorial Scholarship Fund. Jane Drake requested help from the AKAA to use any money available to assist her in a concert venue of Bob Richardson's former students that she is promoting. Treasurer Atkins indicated that there have been no donations to the AKAA for this fund, with all money going to AKAA scholarship fund in remembrance of Bob Richardson. Discussion indicated that using the AKAA's tax free status for clearing any funds collected by Ms. Drake could endanger our tax exempt status. Discussions indicated that there were some missing gaps in our institutional memory of the history of the Bob Richardson Memorial Scholarship Fund. Lisa Ray volunteered to review the archives for all references. These references were later mailed to all board members.

Archivist's Report. The board authorized Jef Thurman to continue his archival media restoration project under a previous funding authorization; for copies of the CD's produced at the 75th reunion, increased security for the display room for 2006, and a request for copies of media files from previous reunions.

Publicity. Richard Garrett agreed to head up publicity with help from Charlie Higgins, Hank Elliot and Jack Dresher.

Reunion 2006 Plans. Charlie Higgins reports plans well under way. The dance floor will be outside the concert hall this year. Jeremy Leff will be consulted to add monitors for the band. Noted was the excellent sound management and how every inch of the ballroom received a quality blanket of sound.

Volunteer Staffing for ticket tables and registration tables is becoming difficult: too much to do for too few volunteers. Board Members and AKAA members are asked to solicit assistance from willing spouses (or even volunteer to assist). Use of paid staff was offered as a suggestion. The fast turnaround for the 2005 CD's was noted and Rod will handle the 2006 recording and distribution. Richard Garrett requested that the rehearsal schedule be amended



so bands would rehearse in the ballroom on the days when they would perform. He also requested a bass amp that all bands could use in order to speed band transitions and ease the burden on bass players.

The proposal to merge the 40's and 48/49 band, proposed at the 75th reunion, has not reached fruition. Indications are that the band leaders did not meet and that the bands will play as separate units at the 2006 reunion, unless follow-up shows that the bands have completed merger talks. The board reiterated its position to support an era band's right to perform, as long as the members so wished. Also discussed were proposals for perpetuating the era sounds of retired bands through the program(s) of the current band or other era bands (a la the type of medley J. Owen and the current band rendered at the 2005 reunion).

The two band limit for players was again endorsed. Players and bandleaders are encouraged to plan accordingly, likewise, to adhere to the 45 minute concert limit.

Board of Trustees' Scholarship Donation. J. Dresher reports continuing

follow-up with a AU trustee who has 'promised' a \$10K donation, once he is sure that the donation will be tax deductible. Once received, Mr. Dresher plans to leverage this donation to pursue other large ticket donations to the scholarship fund. The board acknowledged his efforts and encouraged him to continue his pursuits.

Adjournment. President Siler closed the meeting at 1:27 p.m.
